

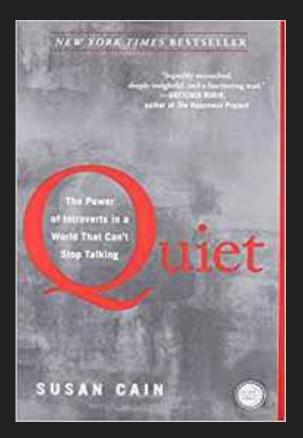
The Wild Introvert

"Introversion is a preference for environments that are not overstimulating which is different from shyness."

"Introverts often work more slowly and deliberately.

They like to focus on one task at a time and have mighty powers of concentration.

They're relatively immune to the lures of wealth and fame."

"They listen more than they talk, think before they speak, and often feel as if they express themselves better in writing than in conversation.

They tend to dislike conflict."

Description of Extroverts

"We also see talkers as leaders. The more a person talks, the more other group members direct their attention to him, which means that he becomes increasingly powerful as the meeting goes on."

"Introverts, in contrast, may have strong social skills and enjoy parties and business meetings, but after a while wish they were home in their pajamas."

"They prefer to devote their energies to close friends, colleagues, and family."

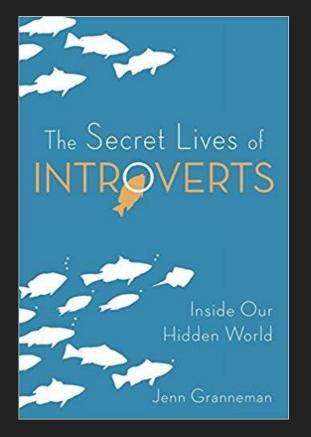

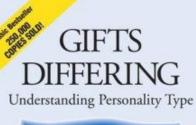

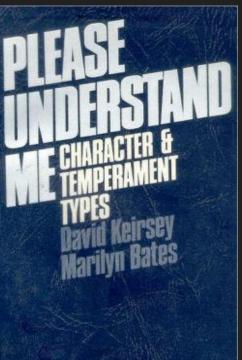

PERSONALITY TYPES KEY



Extroverts

are energized by people, enjoy a variety of tasks, a quick pace, and are good at multitasking.

Introverts

often like working alone or in small groups, prefer a more deliberate pace, and like to focus on one task at a time.

Thinkers

tend to make decisions using logical analysis, objectively weigh pros and cons, and value honesty, consistency, and fairness.

Feelers

tend to be sensitive and cooperative, and decide based on their own personal values and how others will be affected by their actions.



Sensors

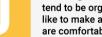
are realistic people who like to focus on the facts and details, and apply common sense and past experience to come up with practical solutions to problems.



Intuitives

prefer to focus on possibilities and the big picture, easily see patterns, value innovation, and seek creative solutions to problems.

Judgers



tend to be organized and prepared, like to make and stick to plans, and are comfortable following most rules.



Perceivers

prefer to keep their options open, like to be able to act spontaneously, and like to be flexible with making plans.

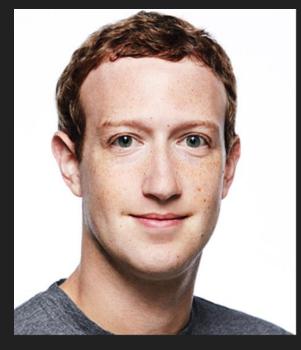
